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**St. Kateri Tekakwitha**

Memorial July 14

Kateri Tekakwitha was born to a Mohawk chief and a Christian Algonquin mother. She was 4 years old when she lost both her parents and her brother to smallpox. She survived, but the disease damaged her eyesight and left scars on her face. Kateri had regular contact with Christian missionaries, and by the time she was a teenager she was determined to forgo marriage and devote herself to Christ. She was baptized on Easter Sunday in 1676, at nineteen years old. Her piety was known and admired by the Jesuits, but her faith made her a subject of suspicion and derision among the people of her village. At approximately twenty-five years old, her health began to fail. The priest who attended her reported that about fifteen minutes after her death, her face began to glow, and her small pox scars disappeared. In 2012 she was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI. She is the first Native American to be declared a saint and is known as “the Lily of the Mohawks”.
