The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, Purification of the Blessed Virgin, meeting of the Lord, Candlemas: February 2nd

This feast commemorates the day when Mary and Joseph brought the baby Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem for the first time. In Mosaic law it was required to consecrate their firstborn son to God. Additionally, it required Mary to submit to ritual purification forty days after childbirth, which involved making a sacrificial offing in the temple. This feast day also commemorates the encounter in the temple between the Holy Family and St. Simeon the prophet and St. Anna the prophetess. Churching

In the current calendar, our focus is on the Prestation, but in previous eras the Church highlighted the Purification. From the observance of the Purification of Mary came the tradition of "churching" women. This was the blessing of a woman, forty days after childbirth (regardless of outcome), that reintroduced her to society after her period of recovery at home. This tradition was an acknowledgement of the difficulty of childbirth and new motherhood, and an official Church mandate for women to rest for six weeks after giving birth. In fact, men were expected to tend to domestic affairs during this time. (*The Catholic All Year Compendium* by Kendra Tierney, pg 132-133)

The Blessing of Candles

"For my eyes have seen your salvation/which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, /a light for revelation to the Gentiles, / and for glory to your people Israel" ~St. Simeon (Luke 2:30-32). Jesus is the Light of the World, so this is the day when the Church blesses candles for use throughout the year. Traditionally, families would bring their own candles to Candlemas to be blessed and used in their own homes. Candles used in the Liturgy must contain 51 percent beeswax but unless one is using them for sacramentals in one's own home beeswax is not required. (*The Catholic All Year Compendium* by Kendra Tierney, pg 133-134)

One example of what occurs during a Candlemas celebration is the priest offers five prescribed orations before he blesses beeswax candles by sprinkling and incensing. The candles are then distributed while the Canticle of Simeon is sung with the antiphon "Lumen ad revelationem gentium et gloriam plebis tuæ Israel," "A Light to the revelation of the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel," repeated after every verse. Then follows the procession, and at which all the partakers carry lighted candles in their hands, the choir sings the antiphon "Adorna thalamum tuum, Sion", composed by St. John of Damascus. The solemn procession represents the entry of Christ, the Light of the World, into the Temple. (Candlemas as described by fssp.com)
