The Power of Silence

We often forget that Christ loved to be silent. He set out for the desert, not to go into exile, but to encounter God. And at the most crucial moment in his life, when there was screaming on all sides, covering him with all sorts of lies and calumnies (defamation of character), when the high priest asked him: "Have you no answer to make?" Jesus preferred silence.

It is a case of true amnesia: Catholics no longer know that silence is sacred, it is God's dwelling place. How can we rediscover the sense of silence as the manifestation of God? This is the tragedy of the modern world: man separates himself from God because he no longer believes in the value of silence. Without silence, God disappears in the noise. And this noise becomes all the more obsessive because God is absent.

Unless we rediscover silence, we are lost. We are rushed into nothingness, without silence. Cardinal Robert Sarah wrote a book on, "The Power of Silence" in it he writes, "Silence is more important than any other human work, for it expresses God. The true revolution comes from silence; it leads us toward God and others so as to place ourselves **humbly** and generously at their service."

What virtue can be expected from this silence? Humility.



[G]enuine humility does not produce inward turmoil, nor does it cause unrest in the soul, or bring it darkness or aridity: on the contrary, it cheers it and produces in it the opposite effects—quietness, sweetness and light. Though it causes us distress [to behold our own wretchedness] we are comforted to see what a great favor God is granting us by sending us that distress and how well the soul is occupied. Grieved as it is at having offended God, it is also encouraged by his mercy." - St Teresa of Avila
